A Message from the President

Clients, Colleagues and Friends of CMA: I had a health scare recently. Well, I wouldn't exactly say it was a health scare – it was a potential health scare. I went to the optometrist to get a new pair of glasses, thinking I had gotten a couple pair only a few years earlier. When I went in, I realized that it had been more than five years since my last eye examination (times flies in engineering). The doctor noticed an "anomaly" and asked me if anyone had ever mentioned to me before. Having worn glasses since 13 and having had many exams since that first pair, I was a little upset to report that I had not heard of this anomaly before. The doctor mentioned it was potentially a condition called melanocytoma which could be cancerous – though he quipped it was a very low chance of that. Like any educated person hearing this news, I ran home to check WebMd and several other eye related sites that then put me in a bit of a mild panic. The doctor asked me to "come back in six months and we'll see if it changed." Knowing he said there was a 1 in 10,000 chance it was cancerous, I did my best to settle my panic and I went about my business. I told very few friends and just made sure I was going to make that appointment in six months.

Six months roll by and a big meeting was scheduled on the date of my exam. I called to see if I could have it moved only a day or so, but to my surprise, I wasn't listed in the doctor's calendar. I made an appointment then and a few days later I arrived at the office. My original doctor had moved on so the new doctor asked if I wanted a full exam; when I told him the previous doctor's concern, he had photos taken of the anomaly and firmly referred me to a specialist to determine pathology. Two and a half long weeks later, I was sitting in the specialist's office after having gone through my third full eye exam in six months waiting for a doctor. When out stepped this doctor that looked like Doogie Howser, M.D. He looked 25 and I was starting to lose faith in the system! When I walked into the actual examination room, there was an older gentleman sitting at the computer who smiled at me as I walked in. He made small talk with me about my profession and told a few not so flattering stories about engineers offering to rearrange his workspace to make it more efficient. When he asked my trouble, I pulled out my smartphone and proudly



showed the image I had been stressing over for weeks. He smiled and said it was a congenital defect and that there was no problem. He did another quick exam to verify the assistant's finding and to give Doogie a chance to see that I apparently have a "rotated disc" in that same eye – whatever that means. Why did I share this story? I guess because I think there are a few lessons to learn here. The first one is to value life experience in others, particularly professions. My condition wasn't unique, but for less experienced people that have only heard of things with potentially dire consequences in books, it could seem very serious. I really credit our new Board of Directors with helping me really prioritize the things that make CMA truly special. Their combined over 150 years of experience give our management team a wealth of resources to draw upon (see our new BOD member, Bill Thorp on Page 2). The second lesson learned is that it doesn't do anyone a bit of good for you to panic internally about things. Everyone should have a network of family, friends, mentors and colleagues that they can lean on in difficult times. I know I'm thinking about who I spend my time as if it's finite and not wasting time on those that really and truly aren't worth it. For better or worse, I'm the gatekeeper of my time. The last lesson that I really get from all this is thinking about what's truly important to you every day. The worst case scenario would have been a terminal cancer that spread quickly through me. I would have had to prioritize how I spent my last days. Instead, I have the benefit of that lesson without the unpleasant side effect of death. This issue is full of celebrations along those lines, with our Best Places to Work Award (Page 1), our family picnic with, can you imagine it, nearly 100 in attendance (Page 2), our company wide planning meeting and new company photo (Page 3) and celebrating the accomplishments of my friend and business partner, Jose Acosta P.E. (Miami Office), being recognized as a 40 Under 40 by the South Florida Business Journal. Last but not least are both Sarah Matin, P.E. (Orlando Office) and Jose becoming officers of the ASCE Florida Section, a cause near and dear to my heart (Page 3).
